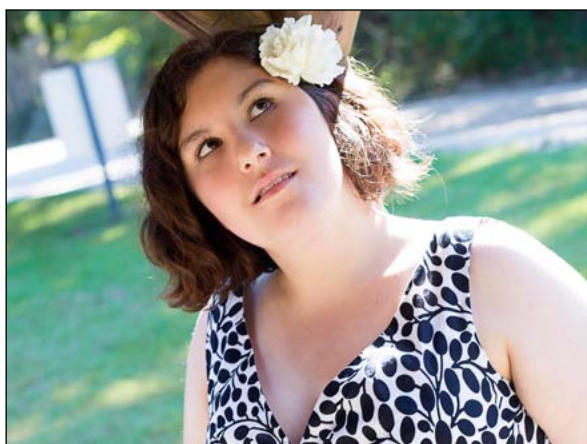
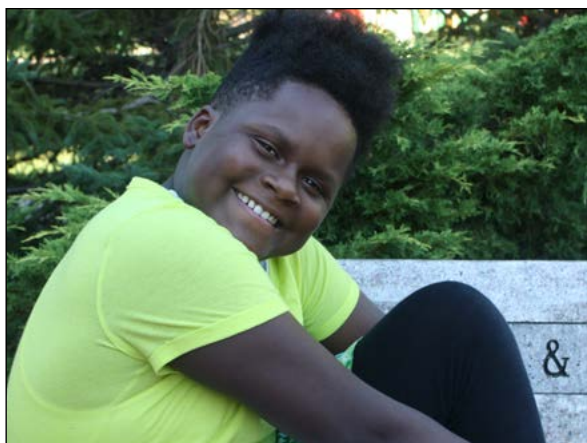

**Match Support Program**  
Helping families stay together

**T**HE MICHIGAN ADOPTION Resource Exchange offers a couple of important programs designed to help adoptive families. The first is called the Waiting Family Forum, which are held periodically throughout the year. Join MARE's Adoption Navigators and learn exactly what happens to your inquiries after you submit them on the MARE website, find out what you can do to make the most of your wait time, learn ways to strengthen your inquiries, get tips on how to effectively advocate for your family, and meet other waiting families. Families who are approved to adopt and families who are in the process of completing their home study are all welcome to attend. For more information, contact MARE at 800-589-6273.

Another service is called the Match Support Program, which is a division of MARE that provides short term (90 day) interventions for families who are in the process of adopting a child matched from the MARE website. Match Support Specialists serve families throughout the state of Michigan and utilize a strength-based, family-centered plan to



**High Anxiety?**  
**How to follow up on inquiries**

So you've found a child or sibling group on MARE that you think would be perfect for your family. You've submitted your inquiry on [www.mare.org](http://www.mare.org) and now it seems like crickets are chirping. You keep checking your email and double-checking to make sure your phone's ring is on. Still no news? So what's a waiting family to do?

1. **Let your Navigator know!** As soon as you've made your online inquiry, send an email to your MARE Adoption Navigator and CC your Adoption Worker. We can help advocate for your family by sending an email to the workers. You have any additional items such as an online family showcase, we can send that to the child's worker at this time.
2. **Check on your home study.** After a week, contact your Adoption Worker to verify that your home study was sent out to the child's worker.
3. **Give it time.** After 21 days, contact your Adoption Worker to see if there is any news from the child's worker. (By state policy, the workers have 21 days to follow up with each other.)
4. **Follow up with MARE.** If after 30 days, you still have no response, contact your MARE Adoption Navigator. We will use MARE as received any follow up. If not, we can contact the workers to facilitate communication. At MARE, we keep track of all inquiries and the follow up information we receive.

Keep in mind that not every family who inquires about a child will receive

guide families in finding helpful resources as well as helping them build their support system throughout the adoption process.

Match Support Program services are provided to families who have been matched with a child photolisted on the MARE website. A family can refer themselves for services or a family can be referred by their Adoption Worker, the child's adoption or foster care worker or an Adoption Navigator. ## Who are the children who wait for adoption?

Adopting a “waiting child” from foster care is often referred to as special needs adoption. This term often makes people think of children with severe mental or physical impairments. In reality, special needs adoption means a child or children who may be difficult to place for adoption for a variety of reasons, including:

- Children school aged and above.
- Children with emotional, mental, learning or physical impairments.
- Children of minority heritage.
- Children who are part of a sibling group that must be placed together.

Many waiting children have had traumatic past experiences that may include physical, sexual or emotional abuse and/or severe neglect. Others may have been born drug or alcohol exposed.

Around 93% of children in Michigan’s foster care system are adopted by the child’s current foster family or a relative (someone with whom the child has an established relationship with). The remaining children available for adoption, like those in this periodical and the MARE website, have no identified family to adopt them. Recruitment of a suitable adoptive family is, therefore, necessary. Over 98% of the children available for adoption without an identified family are over the age of 5. Over 75% of those children are between the ages of 11 and 18.

## Who can adopt a waiting child?

Many people may be surprised to learn that they do not have to be married in order to adopt a child from the foster care system. Potential adoptive parents do not have to own their own home or have a lot of money. They must have enough space in their home and adequate income to support a child. It is important to know that many children waiting for adoption are eligible to receive support subsidies to help adoptive families meet their needs.

## How much does it cost to adopt a child from foster care?

The only cost you should incur for adopting a child from the Michigan foster care system is court filing fees. Some agencies may charge a fee for the Family Assessment (also known as a Home Study). However, once you adopt a child through Michigan’s foster care system, that fee is reimbursed to you. Families must be approved through the Adoptive Family Assessment process before a child can be placed

in their home for adoption. An Adoptive Family Assessment must be completed by a licensed adoption agency (which can be found in the back of this periodical and on the MARE website) and can take an average of six months to a year to complete. The Adoptive Family Assessment will include, but is not limited to, the following components:

- Personal history
- Health statements
- Criminal background check
- Income statement
- Personal references

Once the Adoptive Family Assessment is complete, you may start submitting inquiries to MARE about children you may be interested in adopting. When you inquire about children through the MARE website, your information will be sent, by MARE, to the child’s adoption worker for consideration. Your worker will also be notified that you have inquired about a specific child or children.

- Staunch advocates for the services that will help Ascenda thrive at home, and in school.

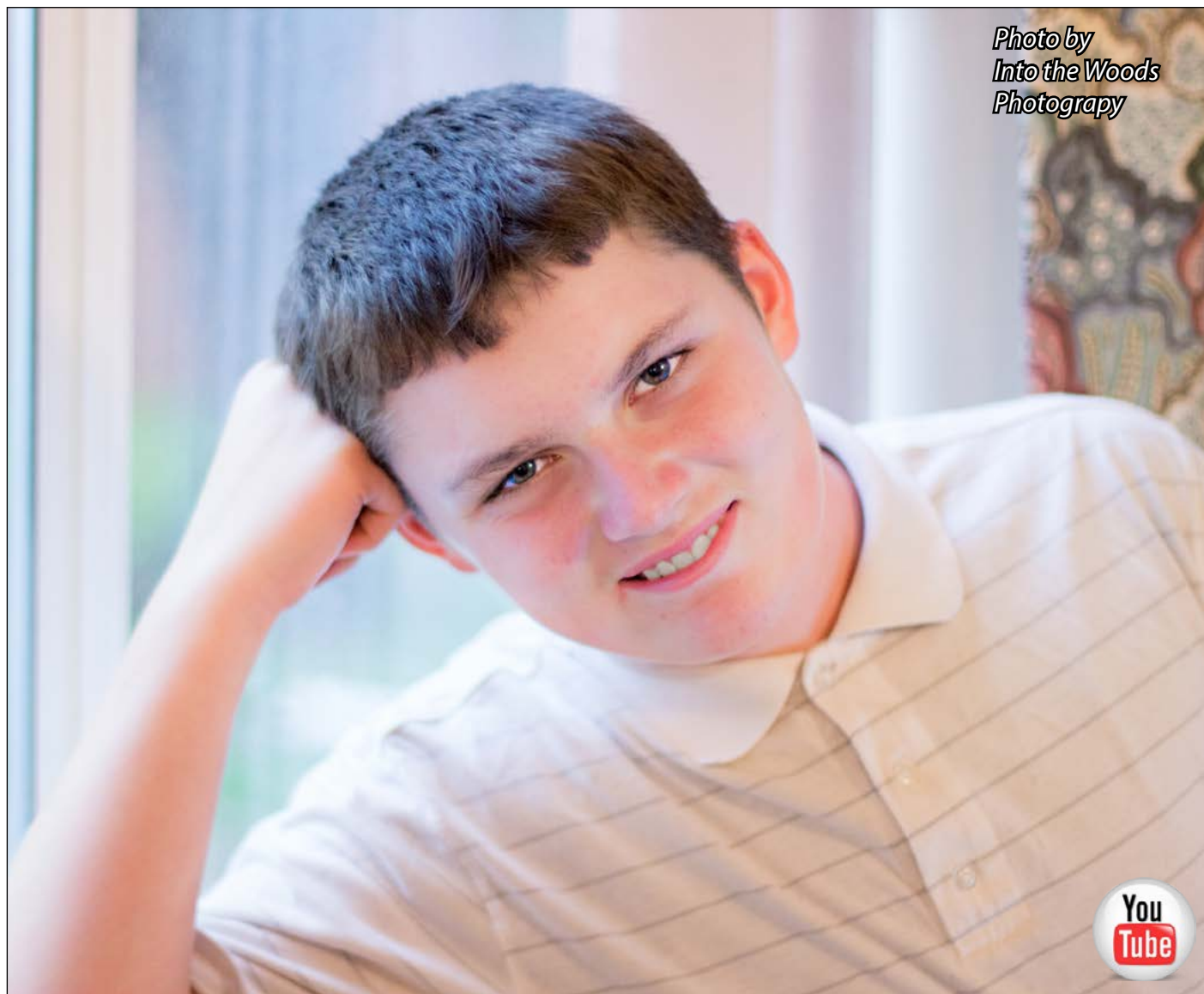
### Did you know?

1. The Advanced Search button on the View Waiting Children link lets you sort your search for available children by gender, age, race and impairment levels.
2. Under the Find a Licensed Agency link, you can

look for resources for foster care and special needs adoptions as well as infant and international adoptions. There's even a resource link for getting pregnancy counseling services.

3. On the Events Calendar, you can find training sessions held throughout Michigan, everything from orientations to adoptive parent support group meetings.

- Wants to feel secure and supported.



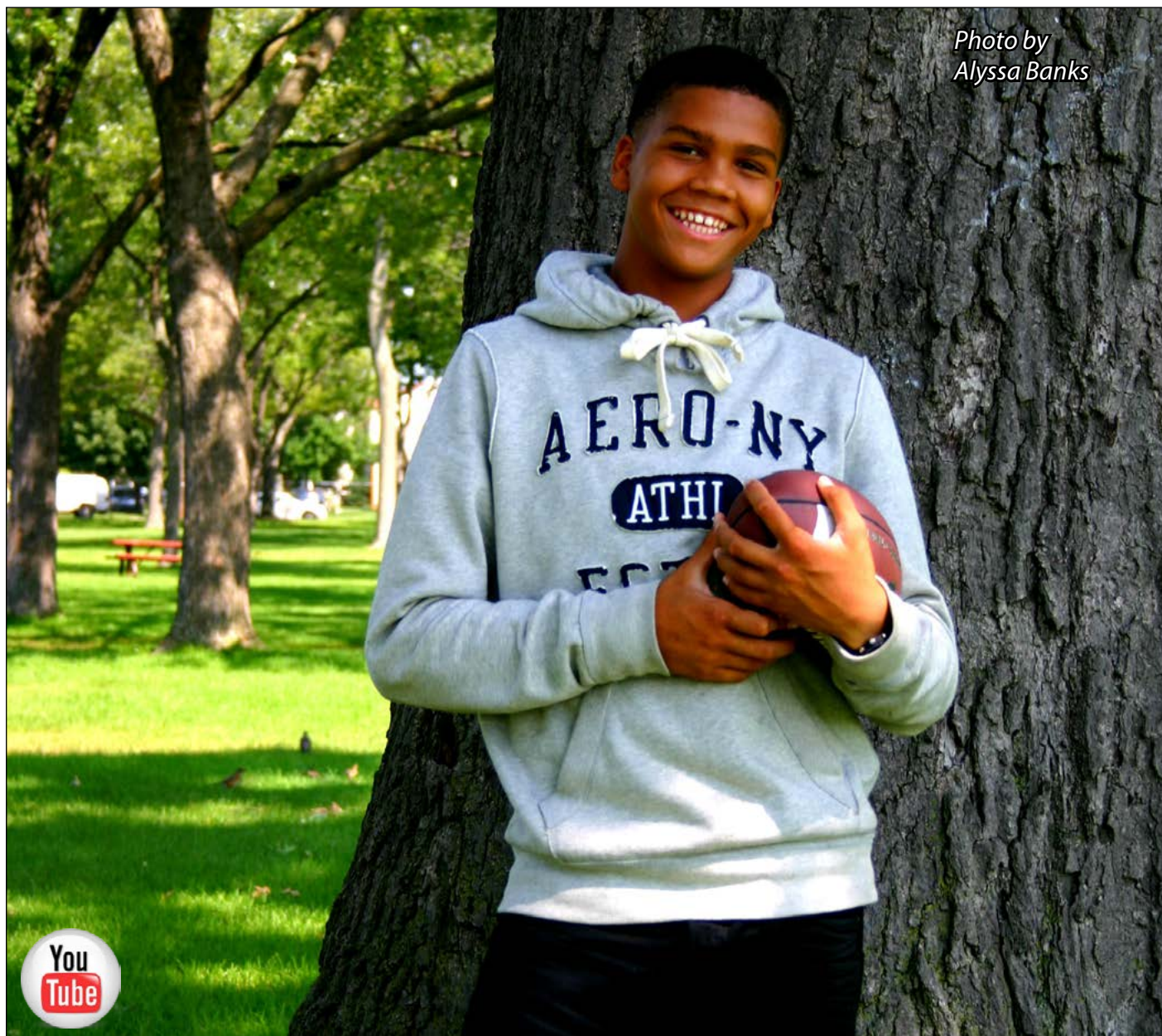

- Describes herself as “energetic, caring and laid back” with a good sense of humor.

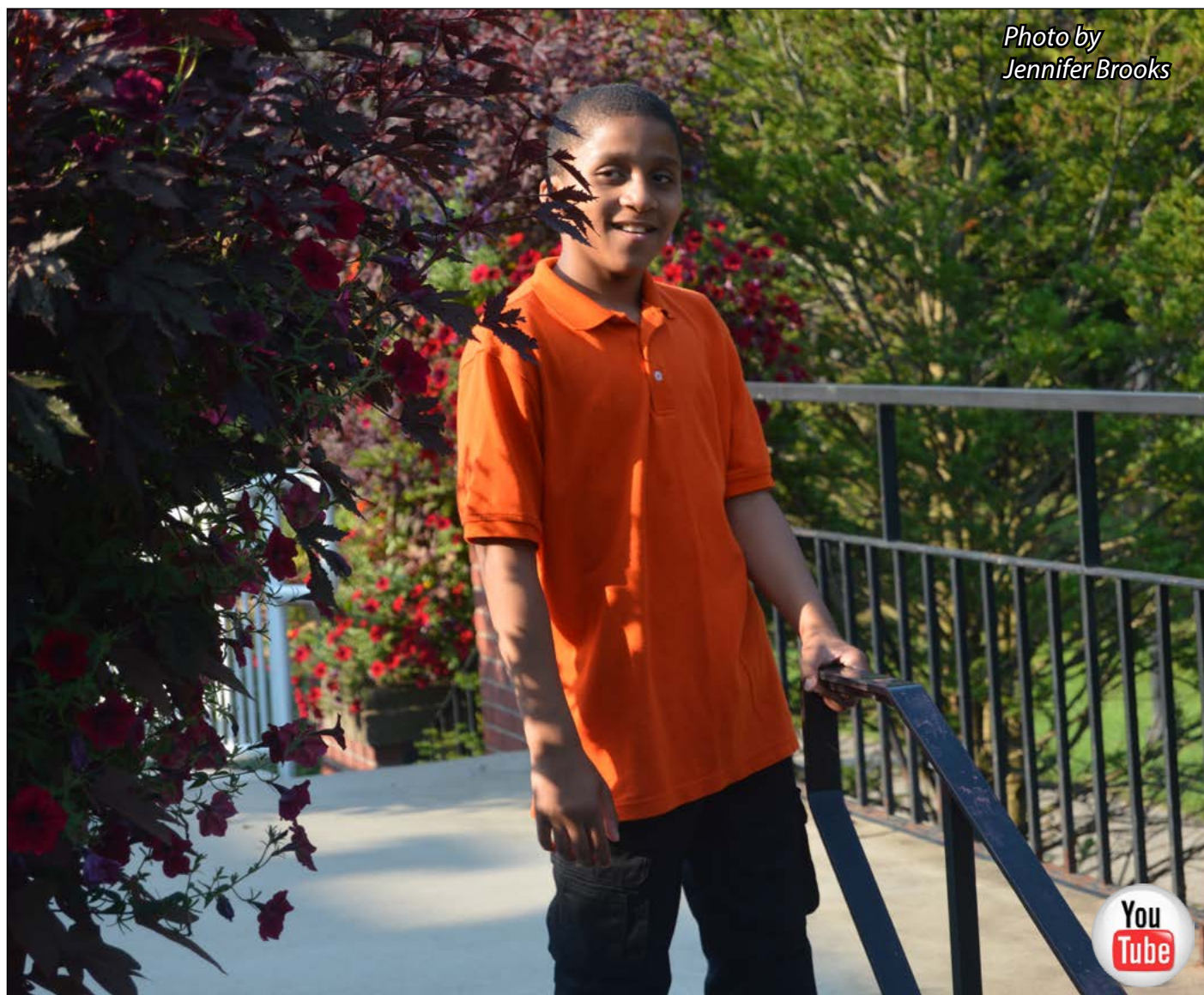
### Qualities of a forever family:
