Connecting With Kids

Often, when waiting families come to MARE match parties, they're looking to have that perfect connection with a child. That Aha! moment that lets them know the child they're spending time with is exactly the right fit for their family.

Sometimes that instant connection happens – for both the family and the child. But other times, a connection needs time to grow.

When I was matched with my son in 2007, I hadn't met him yet. The match had been made purely through my meetings with his social worker and my review of his disclosure information. I sent him a scrapbook and talked to him on the phone once after being matched with him, and then I went to meet him. I fully expected to feel an instant rush of love for this boy that was to become my son. Instead, he was a stranger to me as I was to him – and that's exactly what it felt like.

I was devastated at my lack of emotion for this child. I was scared that I had made a horrible mistake and had committed myself to a child I had no connection to.

Then my social worker gave me some wise, though somewhat inelegant, advice. She said "Sometimes people don't attach to their biological infants right away. How can you expect to instantly attach to a big, dirty 10-year-old?"

She was right. Love just needed time to grow.

Keith and Sharon were a MARE Family Registry family who attended several match parties. Ultimately, they were matched with a child they inquired about after meeting him at a party. Sharon shared her feelings about connection and attachment with their son.

"At some (match parties) we were not drawn to any of the children. At some we were interested in one or two children, but I can't say that there was a connection. At the Imlay City match party my husband started a conversation with a child that looked angry and withdrawn. I saw a connection in the interaction and later, my husband expressed that he felt a connection. That is the child that now lives with us. We are working toward adoption. Some days we work as a family, but without warning, suddenly our son will pull away from us in an angry display. Attachment may take the rest of our lives."

Like Keith and Sharon, you may experience varying levels of connection with kids you meet at MARE match parties. You may have a lightning bolt-like connection, you may have a more subtle draw to a child, or you may not feel a great pull to a child at all.

At MARE, we recommend families who attend match parties spend a little time with each child – talking to them, getting to know them a little bit. Keep in mind that your connection may not be instant and look for more subtle clues that you should inquire about a child. We recommend that you give love time to grow.

Smile! Family Slideshows Can Strengthen Inquiries

The Adoption Navigator team is fortunate to be able to work with so many dedicated families, who are eager to expand their families through adoption. During the search for a child or sibling group, it is not uncommon for families to find themselves wanting to become more involved in the matching process. We do encourage a high level of self-advocacy when adopting is high on a family's list of personal goals.

If you are currently waiting to become matched with a child, creating your own family slideshow is a great way to draw positive attention to your family.

If you are currently working with an Adoption Navigator, your slideshow can be forwarded to a child's caseworker when a potential match exists. For children over the age of 14, the child's voice is especially important and is taken into account when choosing a family. Whether you are considering a younger child or a teenager, the slideshows can help as the children's workers move closer towards making a decision on which family should adopt.

The program most often used by families is Smilebox. To begin creating a family slideshow, visit www.smilebox.com, a user friendly program with a free download. Your personal slideshow can be

emailed directly to your Adoption Navigator for sharing purposes.

Want to create a family slideshow as described in the article to the left? Make sure to follow these guidelines for a slideshow that really captures your family's strengths.

DO include captions, such as:

- Why adoption is important to your family.
- Activities or family traditions your family looks forward to sharing with a child.

DO include:

- Your first name(s) or your last name in the beginning and end of the slideshow to help your names "stick." "The _____ family." is a popular choice.

DO include photos of:

- Immediate members of your household.
- Your family enjoying favorite activities.
- Perks of your home environment, such as bedroom photos, play areas and outdoor / other recreational spaces.
- Limited photos of family pets.
- Your family's culture or culturally diverse city or town.
